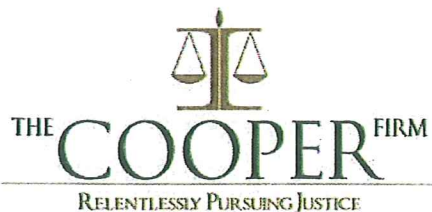

Trick-or-Treating Safety



To get your children ready for trick-or-treating and Halloween, here are a few safety points on how to prepare their costumes and what to discuss before they leave:

- Buy flame retardant costumes.
- Hem their costumes so they don't trip and fall and apply reflective tape.
- Use make-up instead of masks. Masks can impair vision.
- Make sure they wear comfortable and practical shoes.
- Have them keep their costume and wig away from candles or heat.
- Plan and know their route ahead of time.
- Trick or treat in familiar neighborhoods.
- Pack a flashlight with fresh batteries after dark.
- Give them a cell phone or money for a phone call so they can reach you if needed.
- Always have them trick-or-treat in groups or accompany them.
- Set a curfew and give them a watch with a backlight.
- Teach them to stay on the sidewalks and to cross only at intersections and designated crosswalks.
- Tell them to walk with their head up and be aware of their surroundings.
- Instruct that they should only visit well lit

houses. They should not stop at dark houses or enter any houses unless they have your permission.

- Explain that they should not accept rides from strangers.
